ABOUT US

Coast Electric Power Association, headquartered in Kiln, Miss., provides reliable, affordable electric service to Hancock, Harrison and Pearl River counties. Formed in 1937 by members of the community, the not-for-profit cooperative now provides power to more than 83,000 homes and businesses across over 6,900 miles of line. Our board of directors, advisory committee, management team and employees are committed to serving our consumermembers 24 hours a day, seven days a week, while striving to make our communities a better place to live, work and play.

Coast Electric is one of 11 electric cooperatives to receive power from Cooperative Energy, our generation and distribution cooperative headquartered in Hattiesburg, Miss. Together, these cooperatives provide electrical service to 55 counties in Mississippi, from the delta to the coast. Coast Electric is part of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, an organization that represents more than 900 electric cooperatives nationwide that serve 42 million Americans. As a Touchstone Energy Cooperative, Coast Electric is also part of a nationwide family with a strong brand identity that allows participating electric co-ops to tell their stories with one voice and to serve as advocates for members.

COMMUNITY

One of the seven principles that guides Coast Electric is concern for the community. Every year, employees volunteer countless hours improving our community both as representatives of Coast Electric and in their personal lives. Last year, our employees collected food donations at our Fill A Bucket food drives, donated blood at American Red Cross blood drives, raised funds for the American Cancer Society and the American Heart Association, volunteered for the United Way Day of Service and so much more. Coast Electric employees also spent time cleaning our adopted stretches of highways, unloaded hazardous materials from 617 vehicles at our Household Hazardous Waste Day, and spent a weekend at McLeod Park collecting trash and debris from the Jourdan River.

As part of our community efforts, Coast Electric is also committed to our future members. In addition to partnering with schools for career fairs, our Lineman of the Week program, and the Pathways2Possibilites career expo, we once again sponsored four high school juniors for the Electric Cooperatives of Mississippi Youth Leadership Program. These students attended a three-day workshop in Jackson, Miss., and a Youth Tour of Washington, D.C., where they visited monuments and historical sites, met with Mississippi's senators and representatives, and joined close to 2,000 students representing co-ops from across the country.







SERVICE

Our employees work hard all year long to provide our members with superior service and reliability. The engineering and operations departments continued to work on the Distribution System Construction Work Plan to convert the system voltage from 7,200 volts to 14,400 volts. This project encompasses 25 percent of our distribution system and requires employees to inspect and replace equipment on every structure in the area. The departments have also installed automation equipment that will decrease outage times in 15 regions of the cooperative's service area. These regions have been selected based upon several factors including the density of meters and the critical nature of the load served. There are plans to install this equipment in more regions, making the system more reliable than ever.

In 2019, our energy management team worked to help members use energy as conveniently and efficiently as possible. The department conducted energy fairs at each district office and participated in demonstrations at the Gulf Coast Home Show, Senior Fairs, Pathways2Possiblities, Stennis Energy Day, the Coast Electric Annual Meeting and other community events. They distributed energy efficiency information to more than

4,500 members and certified 234 Comfort Advantage new homes, 571 Comfort Advantage home heat pump changeouts, 41 commercial heat pump changeouts and 239 energy audits. Through these efforts, we have been able to help members manage their energy use and save money on their monthly bills.







OPERATION ROUND UP

For many years, Coast Electric members have been generously rounding up their bills to fund Share Your Blessings, an energy assistance program that helps those in need pay their electric bills. Near the end of 2018, Coast Electric, in partnership with the Gulf Coast Community Foundation, enhanced the Operation Round Up program by forming a community trust that provides grants for charitable organizations serving Hancock, Harrison and Pearl River counties. Now 65 percent of members' donations are put into the community trust to fund grants awarded quarterly, 25 percent of donations go to Share Your Blessings and 10 percent of donations are put into an endowment for future funding opportunities.

Operation Round Up is a nationwide program making a positive impact in cooperative communities across the country and now is making a long-lasting, positive impact in our local community. A committee of nine members serves as the Community Trust Committee and help determine what projects to fund. In 2019, thanks to our generous members, we issued 56 grants totaling \$352,192 to local charities in our community and donated \$106,492 to our Share Your Blessings energy assistance fund. While it may not seem like your spare change can do much, when









combined with the efforts of your fellow Coast Electric members, your pennies and dimes are supporting projects that improve the quality of life for your friends and neighbors.

2019 NOTABLE MENTIONS

- The Today in Mississippi member publication was converted from a newspaper to a magazine.
- We achieved an all-time high score of 89 on the American Customer Satisfaction Index.
- We partnered with CoBank's Sharing Success program to donate \$11,000 to William Carey University, \$2,000 to Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College and \$2,000 to Pearl River Community College
- Employees pledged \$41,989 to the United Way of South Mississippi.



- Members filled 3,247 prescriptions and saved \$49,169 through our Co-op Connections program, bringing our overall totals since 2009 to 241,374 prescriptions filled and \$3,407,347 saved.
- We retired \$5,458,015 in capital credits to Coast Electric members.
- We maintained 83,924 meters, 6,988 miles of line and sold 1,776,192,981 kilowatt hours.
- The Right-of-Way Department maintained 1,195 miles of line (approximately 3,585 acres), which included 168,801 trees trimmed, 8,875 trees removed and 1,015 hazard trees removed.
- Cooperative Energy, together with its 11 member distribution cooperatives, announced the award of the Cooperative Competes grants, including three in Hancock County. The grants were awarded to the Hancock Aviation Aerospace Workforce Academy, the Hancock Port and Harbor
